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# Field Trips

 Field Trips are scheduled monthly to seek out birds in different habitats.

> The club members may wander a fen seeking Northern Water Thrush, watch nesting bald eagles at Muskatatuck National Wildlife Refuge, or spend an evening watching short-eared owls hunt at Killdeer Plains.

- Besides ornithological interests, trips may explore history, geology, botany, butterflies, reptiles and amphibians.
- Half-day trips are planned for local birds in Darke County. Extended overnight trips may travel to Canada, The Wilds, Crane Creek and beyond!
- Trips allow members to become more proficient in bird identification and expand their awareness of bird behavior and the habitats they live in.
