The evening is a fund raising event with all proceeds going towards maintenance, repairs, and cultural programming within the log house. From the Director's Desk...

Darke County Parks is always in a state of change and growth in programming just like the changes in our four seasons in Ohio. Each season brings new and exciting activities for our park visitors to enjoy and learn. We continue to grow and bring our educational presentations to more schools and more grade levels. Our volunteer ranks are expanding, and it is encouraging to see the next generation of park stewards step forward to assist with projects and programs.

This fall is no different as park district employees and volunteers have taken on additional responsibilities by growing two acres of sorghum, broom corn, and Indian corn in collaboration with our neighbors at Country Side Gardens. In the spirit of our Prairie Days Festival on September 24th and 25th you will see apple butter boiled and sorghum pressed as it was done in the late 1800's and early 1900's and then boiled down into sorghum molasses at Shawnee Prairie's Sugar Shack. Broom corn will get woven into brooms along with several other crafts presented under the big tent. Our encampment area will provide a look into the past and visitors can walk through the encampment to ask questions and review each camp. A schoolmarm will also conduct lessons for visiting children along with historical games. Take a ride on the horse drawn wagon or tractor and wagon rides through the prairie to see all the activities offered before taking time to explore each. Stop and visit our log house and blacksmith shop to watch different projects and crafts made or how the blacksmith was truly the jack of all trades during the period. (Remember strike while the iron is hot!) Don't miss the opening ceremonies at 10am on Saturday as we salute the fifteen stars and stripes with a volley of black powder musket fire. As a reminder there are no fees for parking or entrance to Shawnee Prairie Preserve. Free family fun is guaranteed. Parking for the event will once again be off-site except for those needing handicap parking which will be on the Nature Center grounds. Don't miss this year's activities as the amphitheater stage will be busy both days with performing artists.

I would be remiss if I did not thank the over 150 volunteers that make this event possible for the Darke County region. If you have not attended before, don't miss this year, and if you have never volunteered, please consider this event as a great start to your volunteering career. Contact us by email or phone, and we will help you get involved. This year will be extraordinary for Prairie Days 2016!

PARENT & Preschooler Adventures

SEPTEMBER - HISTORY HIKE



Naturalist Corner



ALIENS AMONG US

Did you know that aliens truly exist? They're even here in Darke County, alien plants and animals, or invasive species, that is!

An invasive species is any species of plant or animal that is not native to a particular area, are usually introduced from other areas, and can cause damage to native plants and animals. A native species is typically defined as a species which has been in the area since or before 1750. Out of more than 2,700 species found in Ohio, less than 100 of these species are classified as invasive, but they can still have a huge impact on the native environment, including displacing rare species, loss of biodiversity, and alteration of soil and water cycles.

One of the most common invasive plants found in this area is honeysuckle, of which two different species are found in Darke County: Amur and Morrow's honeysuckle. These invasive species of honeysuckle are native to Korea and Japan and were introduced to North America in the late 1800s as ornamental plants. Both Amur and Morrow's honeysuckle have hollow stems, while the two native species, bush and Canada fly honeysuckle, have solid stems. All honeysuckle plants have alternating leaves that are about an inch to two and a half inches long contained in standing bushes which can be from six to fifteen fall



tall. The Amur species of honeysuckle has dark green leaves which end in a long, pointy tip, while Morrow's honeysuckle has oval shaped leaves. These plants produce small flowers which bloom in the spring, and dark-red to yellow berries in August to

October.

Because woods and pastures that have been grazed or otherwise disturbed are more vulnerable to invasion, honeysuckle has made a lot of advancement in this area of Ohio. The fruit that the invasive species of honeysuckle produces is attractive to birds, who help scatter the seeds over a wide area. For light infestations, the Ohio Department of Natural Resources recommends carefully hand-removing the entire plant or repeatedly cutting or mowing during the growing season. For larger infestations, an application of herbicide such as Roundup or AquaNeat on the offending plants may be more helpful. However, if you choose to cut the plant down to the ground, Garlon 4 or Pathfinder, applied to the cut stem, has proved to be the most effective at eliminating the invasive species.
